

# COVID-19 VACCINE

All D.C. residents 16+ will be eligible for vaccination through all providers  
April 19, 2021.

## Available Vaccines

### Pfizer

- Authorized for emergency use
- Two doses, delivered three weeks apart
- **95%** effective
- Injection-site pain, fatigue, headaches, chills

### Moderna

- Authorized for emergency use
- Two doses, delivered four weeks apart
- **94.1%** effective
- Injection-site pain, fatigue, muscle aches, joint pain, headaches, chills

### Johnson & Johnson

- Authorized for emergency use
- One dose
- **85%** effective
- Injection-site pain, fatigue, muscle pain, joint pain, headaches, chills

### Novavax

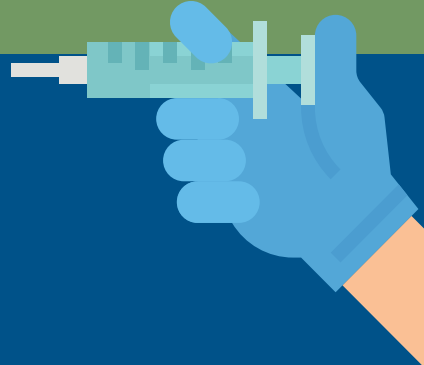
- Vaccine trials ongoing
- Two doses, delivered three weeks apart
- Injection-site pain, rash, headaches, muscle pain, fever

### AstraZeneca

- Vaccine trials ongoing
- Two doses, delivered four weeks apart,
- Fever, muscle aches, headaches, injection site pain
